Annual Convention

Friday, July 8, 2011

Opening The one hundred and fifth session of the Wesleyan Women's Ministry of the South Carolina District convened at Southern Wesleyan University, Central, SC, at 5:00 PM on Friday, July 8, 2011. Julie Kellett, district director, gave words of greeting.

Buddy Rampey, district superintendent of SC District of the Wesleyan Church, presented remarks and prayer.

Worship and Praise Jody Reynolds led the congregation in singing "I Saw the Light" and "Love Will Keep Us Together," along with other worship choruses.

Summit Highlights Joy Bryant, Glenda Hoyle, and Haley Kelley presented happenings and impressions of the general business session recently held at Cypress Wesleyan Church, Galloway, Ohio.

Business Julie Kellett conducted the business of accepting the reports of the district officers and of the zone chairs as read and the roll call from the registration listing.

Cynthia Edge, district WKFM coordinator, presented information for WKFM.

Presentation of Report of Martha Blackburn at Summit Julie Kellett and Margie Massingill presented Martha Blackburn's report from Summit through a Question & Answer format.

Summit Highlights Linda Baker and Marty Grimes related impressions of the Summit.

Resolutions/Vote/ Summit Margie Massingill read the resolutions presented at Summit and gave the results of the vote.

SC WW Action Plan for 2011-2012 Margie Massingill and Julie Kellett presented the SC Wesleyan Women's Ministry Action Plan Work in Progress for 2011-2012, followed by a period for comments/questions. The convention body showed confirmation of the Action Plan by standing.

Awards Frances Wilson was given a token of appreciation for nine years of service to the SC District WW. Margie Massingill was presented a token of appreciation for twenty years of service to the SC District WW.

Summit Highlights and Closing Remarks Sue Rickman related highlights of the Summit, along with a bit of history of Wesleyan Women, and the challenge for the future.

Remarks and Benediction Joan Rampey offered remarks about Wesleyan Women and prayed.

SOUTH CAROLINA DISTRICT WESLEYAN WOMEN DIRECTOR

To the General Superintendent, District Superintendent, members of the South Carolina District Conference, and guests:

It is a privilege and honor to serve as the South Carolina Wesleyan Women Director for this year. We have accomplished a lot this year, and we are excited about the future of Wesleyan Women. I have chaired the executive committee meetings; participated and attended in the planning sessions for the STAT (Stand Against Human Trafficking) event held at Southern Wesleyan University; attended and participated in the planning of the South Carolina Wesleyan Women Retreat held at Myrtle Beach, SC; attended the SCWW Nominating Committee meeting; met with Martha Blackburn, General Director of Wesleyan Women, in appointed meetings, in phone conferences, through e-mail exchanges, and in an April 2011 meeting concerning plans for the future of Wesleyan Women. The resolutions were approved by the voting delegates with an overwhelming majority vote of 122 (Y) and 2 (N) and by the guests with of 130 (Y) and 1 (N). Since the vote at Summit for the restructure of Wesleyan Women, the Action Plan for SC Wesleyan Women will be presented at the SC Wesleyan Women Convention to be implemented for the 2011-2012 fiscal year.

The SC Wesleyan Women Ministry Leadership Team will work diligently with the local church women's groups to equip and encourage them as they organize their ministries. We live in exciting times, and we see the potential for growth in the local church . . . a growth that can signal the greatest harvest that has ever been reached. To God be the glory!

They learned about Cambodia, Nicaragua, and Panama. They enjoyed snacks and foods from different countries and were able to see through pictures what life is like for our missionaries and their children. Our key verse for the year was **Luke 8:11**. 2010-2011 WKFM SUMMARY

The South Carolina district had **fifteen** churches reporting WKFM chapters for 2010-2011. These were Bethany, Carlisle, CenterPoint, Chesnee, Easley First, Heritage, Lyman, Oakway, Pickens View, Piedmont, Pleasant View, Seneca, Trinity, United, and Westminster.

These fifteen churches had a combined total of **155** active WKFM members and **685** honorary WKFM members.

As a district, WKFM sent a total of **\$4934.05** in general funds to headquarters in Indiana, including **\$545.00** for the Pickett children (a district project). There was also a total of **\$893.00** in district funds raised to support other district projects, including Hephzibah Children's Home (\$349), and Southern Wesleyan University (\$240).

The General Office of Wesleyan Women leadership is casting a new mission, vision and core values statement for Wesleyan Women.

Our Mission: Empowering and mobilizing women to live like Christ

Our Vision: Women in the church will be moved to action to transform their world

Our Core Values:

1. We are committed to proclaiming God’s Word at home, in the community and beyond.
2. We believe that Jesus Christ calls us to bring biblical justice in society, to reach out with compassion to the poor, oppressed and suffering, and take action to seek solutions.
3. We joyfully applaud every woman’s obedient response to follow God.
4. We are committed to provide and participate in educational opportunities and experiences that develop leaders and build cooperation in ministry across The Wesleyan Church.

*The Spirit of the Sovereign Lord is on me,
because the Lord has anointed me to preach good news to the poor.
He has sent me to bind up the brokenhearted,
to proclaim freedom for the captives and release from darkness for the prisoners.
Isaiah 61:1, Luke 4:18*

- The SCWW Executive committee will implement the new vision for women's ministries. We will provide training for the local women's groups and encourage them as they design their local women's ministries.

In order for SCWW to implement the new mission and vision for women's ministries, the current organization must be restructured. The mission and vision of empowering, equipping and mobilizing women to be Christ-like must continue to be advanced, with a goal of transforming our local ministries in order to reach today's generation. This restructuring will have significant impact on the local level. But of even greater significance than just changing the structure, these efforts are designed to revitalize the women's ministries in the churches of the SC District.

Leadership Team

- Transition the title of SCWW Executive Committee to SC District of the Wesleyan Church Women's Ministries Leadership Team.
- Implement the formation of a leadership team headed by a director who will be appointed by the DBA. The director will appoint the members of the leadership team, each of whom will then be affirmed by DBA. Formal elections will no longer be held.
- The leadership team will consist of five to seven members. In addition, the leadership team will work closely with the zone leaders in promoting district events.
- For fiscal year 2011-2012, the leadership team will be appointed by the SCWW Director, SCWW Nominating Committee and affirmed by the DBA and the 2011 SCWW Convention.
- SCWW Nominating Committee members elected at the 2010 SCWW Convention members are: Joy Bryant, Nancy Edwards and Joan Crain.
- The primary function of the committee is to nominate women for positions on the leadership team. Due to the restructuring of Women's Ministries the current nominating committee will assist in reassigning the titles and positions of the leadership team.

Impact on the Local Church

- Beginning with the 2011-2012 fiscal year, the General Office of Wesleyan Women will no longer require registration for participation in Women's Ministry. The general office will no longer keep formal records of those churches participating in Wesleyan Women. The Women's Ministry materials will be for purchase only. All churches within the SC district will be considered as participants in SC Women's Ministries.
- In an effort to include all of our churches in the expanding district women's ministries, the leadership team will meet, on a regular basis, with leaders of the women's groups in our ethnic congregations (currently Haitian and Hispanic) to intentionally and effectively encourage and assist them in the development of women's ministries in their communities. Increasingly, avenues will be sought to include them in the planning and implementation of the mission and vision. The rapidly growing diversity in our circle of accountability requires that we fully recognize and embrace our cultural interdependence.
- In the past, Wesleyan Women have been self-supporting on the district and general level. The decision to discontinue registration will have significant financial impact at the general, district, and local level.

Financials:

- SC District Women's Ministries will discontinue district-led mission projects.
- The General Office of Wesleyan Women and the SC District Women's Ministries will promote various ministries; however, the decision will be made by the local church or women's group as to the ministries they desire to contribute to financially.
- Projects that will fulfill the purpose of Women's Ministry will be promoted by the district leadership team. However, other projects will be managed and promoted by the local church.

Local

The local women's groups will not send funds to the SC District Women's Ministry, but the local may send the funds to the General Office of Wesleyan Women's Ministry for mission projects. The local women's groups will decide which ministries to support financially, and monies will be sent through the local church. The local women's groups will no longer be governed by a separate set of guidelines. The local Wesleyan Women's Ministry will be under the leadership of the local church.

District

Funds for district projects and the district operating fund will no longer be received from the local groups. The district women's ministries will no longer be governed by a separate set of guidelines. They will be under the leadership of the DBA.

General

Funds for General Office of Wesleyan Women mission projects and operating fund will be received from the local groups. The 2012 General Church budget will provide financial assistance for the General Office of Wesleyan Women. The General Office of Wesleyan Women will no longer be governed by a separate set of guidelines. They will be under the leadership of the General Board. Wesleyan Women will be in the division of Local Church Services.

WKFM:

- WKFM will continue to be part of SC Women’s Ministries; however, changes may be implemented by the General Office of Wesleyan Women in 2012.
- Some districts and local churches are placing WKFM under their missions committee. The idea is to promote missions in children, teens, and college-age individuals, encouraging them to have a heart of missions and to reach the next generation of missionaries. This committee also promotes short-term mission trips.
- WKFM materials will be available both through Wesleyan Women Ministries and Global Partners.

Since the restructuring of Wesleyan Women will have significant impact on the functioning of the district Wesleyan Women, the following recommendations are made:

- Propose that the DBA consider allocating operational funds for SC Women’s Ministries
- Propose that the DBA consider the formation of a missions committee that would encompass district mission trips, mission projects, the annual missions rally, WKFM, and the SWU scholarship for children of missionaries. SC District Wesleyan Woman have supported this scholarship for many years and desire to see that the scholarship continued.

The following outline illustrates the difference between the missions committee and women’s ministry.

Missions Committee	Women’s Ministry
